Part II - Written Statement of Reasons for Detention

You have been released on numerous cases in the past and you have not done what you were supposed to do. I do not have any basis to think that you will suddenly start doing what I order you to do. If you look at your Johnson County case from 1997, you had nine situations where you did not comply with conditions, and that is too many. That does not even get into the other cases where you have all these bench warrants where you were released and did not comply. I have to determine whether you can comply with conditions of release and I do not see it based on your failure to do so on numerous occasions and numerous cases, so you will remain detained.
